Is Detroit talking about a new V-3?????

Hot topic of most conversations in the Motor City a few weeks ago was the sudden appearance of 100 billboards which featured a stylized car fender and the wording "Testa....V-3 powered." Was a new company with radical concepts on the scene? No, just an enterprising advertising executive who wanted to test the effectiveness of the bill-boards!!!

HORSEPOWER RACE RETURNS!!

They're off and running again in the horsepower race. Chrysler took the lead with its 410 hp engines which will be available in PLYMOUTHS and Dodges starting in May.

Up to this time, the honors went to General Motor's Chevrolet division which boasted a 409 hp engine. Ford and Chrysler were in a two-way tie with 405 hp engines.

A few years ago, the Automobile Manufacturers Association adopted a resolution de-emphasizing speed and horsepower. This went very well during the recession period of 1959-60, but when automakers saw the trend in 1961 was for top-of-the-line models, with extra power and equipment, there was some hasty revision of this thinking.

Speed and power are still not quite equal to economy and compacts in some quarters. But it's becoming obvious that if the money is available, American car buyers want extra power and accessories. Gas savings and price are secondary to a large group of drivers who like, and like to talk about, their car performance.

Chrysler's new engine comes in two versions - one with a compression ratio of 11 to 1, and the other 13.5 to 1. The latter needs fuel with a rating of from 110 to 130 octane, or a special racing fuel. This need for a high quality fuel was one of the main reasons that the higher compression ratios and the hp race was abandoned, or at least slowed down, in the first place. Chrysler Corporation is a

not unlikely leader in this power drive. The company was one of the first to start a hp race in its compact editions by upgrading its 101-hp Valiant to an optional 148. It was during this period that Chevrolet increased its Corvair hp from 80 to an optional 95, and Ford announced plans for an optional 100 horses from its Falcon, up from 90. Later Ford raised its Falcon's power to 128 and so on. Ford is now in the big race with two new high-performance engines for its Mercury Monterey. One of these is equipped with three two-barrel carburctors and is rated at 405 hp.

Chrysler's new engine, mentioned above, is called "Super Stock 413" and will be optional equipment in 1962 Plymouths beginning in May.

FACTS:

The most expensive car in the U.S. is reputed to be a \$53,000 Rolls-Royce Phantom V with a Henri Chapron body designed by O.F. Rivers. This literally palatial machine, which won second prize at the 1961 Pebble Beach Concours d' Elegance, is owned by Mr. and Mrs. Martin Martyn of Beverly Hills. According to Lucius Beebe, who keeps track of such things, "Mrs. Martyn daily and personally dusts the exterior with imperial sable pelts."

ADVANCE SCOOP?

All 1963 model U. S. cars will be equipped with Amber Lights for front turn signals, according to the Automobile Manufacturers Association. Research has indicated that the amber signals can be seen more readily through headlight glare.

RESEARCH:

Disturbed about the TAX BITE at the gas pump? It might surprise (even if it doesn't soothe) you to know that U.S. taxes on gasoline are among the lowest in the world. U.S. and State taxes now average about 40% of the retail price of gasoline. West German taxes total 60%. In Japan they are 106%, in Great Britain 141%, in Italy 245%, and in France a staggering 333%. No wonder they figure their mpg closely abroad!!!

AUTO REPAIRS:

We have some trade figures for the year 1960 which show some interesting sidelights on the most prolific source of "troubles" with passenger car engines. These figures come from 37,496 dealers (both foreign and domestic) and 103,724 independent repair shops.
